

of the Latins, but the language of the Greeks."

The *Great Horologion* comments that "at that time only he and his few disciples were Orthodox in the East." After years of exile in a distant land, living in terrible poverty, he was tried and condemned by the heretical emperor and patriarch. His punishment was severe: his tongue and right hand were cut away and again he was sent into exile where he died in 662. Nonetheless, his lonely and costly stand, whose fruit he did not see in his own lifetime, preserved the Catholic & Orthodox Faith when emperors and patriarchs alike had fallen away.



HOROLOGION: January 21† Our Venerable and Godbearing Father Maximus the Confessor (662). The Catholic Encyclopedia write of him:

"Known as *the Theologian* and as *Maximus Confessor*, born at Constantinople about 580; died in exile 13 August, 662. He is one of the chief

names in the Monothelite controversy one of the chief doctors of the theology of the Incarnation and of ascetic mysticism, and remarkable as a witness to the respect for the papacy held by the Greek Church in his day. This great man was of a noble family of Constantinople. He became first secretary to the Emperor Heraclius, who prized him much, but he quitted the world and gave himself up to contemplation in a monastery at Chrysopolis, opposite Constantinople. He became abbot there- but seems to have left this retreat on account of its insecurity from hostile attacks. He speaks of the Palestinian ascetic St. Sophronius afterwards Patriarch of Jerusalem, as his master, father, and teacher (Ep. 13); so, he probably passed some time with him, and he was with him in Africa with other monks during the preparations which issued in the "watery union" by which Cyrus the Patriarch reconciled a number of Monophysites to the Church by rejecting the doctrine of "two operations" in Christ (see MONOTHELITISM).

Speaking of the primacy of the See of Rome, Maximus stated: For, from the descent of the Incarnate Word amongst us, all the churches in every part of the world have held the greatest Church (i.e, Rome) alone to be their base and foundation, seeing that, according to the promise of Christ Our Savior, the gates of hell will never prevail against her, that she has the keys of the orthodox confession and right faith in Him, that she opens the true and exclusive religion to such men as approach with piety, and she shuts up and locks every heretical mouth which speaks against the Most High. (Maximus, Opuscula theologica et polemica, Migne, Patr. Graec. vol. 90). At another time he wrote: "I have the faith

For the most effective working out of our salvation, we must drive the enemy out of our homes, and keep him at bay by our prayers, our righteous life, and the annual sprinkling by Holy Water at Theophany.

Peer to peer Fundraising: A basic truth in life is that we have a positive feeling towards our family and friends, a tendency to trust in them, and a desire to help them when we are able. Many Churches and non-profits have learned that person to person or peer to peer fundraising can be very successful. When a cause is important to you, your family and friends can sense it by the things you say and the joy and excitement present in your voice.

Yes, people can be skittish when asked for donations; this is mainly because they don't know the one making the request. However, your family and friends know you and your love and devotion to our parish church. If they were asked to help alleviate our need during this financial crisis, I am sure many would joyfully make a contribution in your name. May I suggest you begin with prayer, asking the Holy Spirit for wisdom and discernment. Then, take out your Christmas card list, email list, or Facebook friends list. You could write a short paragraph or two stating the problem, demonstrate that there is a solution, and indicate that they are a definite and powerful part of the solution.

Let them know how important our parish has been in your life, and of the sacrifices you and your loved ones have made to build this beautiful temple to God's glory. Unfortunately, because of the downturn in the economy, parishioners moving away, and deaths in the parish family, contributions have decreased and the church went into default this year. We desperately need to raise \$200,000 to reduce our mortgage so we can refinance and get out from under the weight of our loan. You might suggest an amount you are attempting to raise yourself and/or suggest an amount from them. The amount is not as important as their showing solidarity with you.

Let me offer a sample, but anything you write from your heart would be wonderful.

"Dear friends and family,

I remember how my heart ached a few years ago when dear friends of mine lost their dream home, which they had struggled and sacrificed for and within which they had raised their children. It was devastating to them and to me. I had a similar feeling when it was announced a few weeks ago that my beautiful Byzantine Church of the Annunciation – which I (and spouse) have sacrificed for and within which we have raised our family - was declared in default by our lender because our contribution to indebtedness ratio was off. This was caused by the downturn in the economy, people moving elsewhere for better opportunities, and the deaths of benefactors and parishioners. All the financial institutions we have consulted inform us that we will have to reduce the principal by \$200,000 in a short time or face some very dire consequences.

You know of my tremendous love for our Lord and His holy Church, and how much my family has sacrificed over the years to help build our church from a small mission in a borrowed chapel to our beautiful facilities dedicated to our Holy Lady.

I have committed myself to raising \$4,000 (or whatever amount you might like to put) towards this goal. Any amount you could send the parish in my name would help greatly in reducing our indebtedness and provide relief from our crippling financial burden. Thank you and may our Lord richly bless you.
